I. <u>INTRODUCTION</u>

- 1. Pursuant to the provisions of the High-level Meeting on ECDC held in Cairo in August 1986, the rules of procedure adopted at its first meeting held in Caracas in August 1987, the provisions of the Twelfth Annual Meeting of the Ministers for Foreign Affairs of the Group of 77 held in New York in September 1988, the Seventh Meeting of the Intergovernmental Follow-up and Coordination Committee on ECDC (IFCC-VII) held in Kuala Lumpur in July-August 1989, the First Annual Meeting of the Group of 77, held in New York in September 1989, the Eighth Meeting of the Intergovernmental Follow-up and Coordination Committee on ECDC (IFCC-VIII), held in Panama City in August-September 1993, the Eighteenth and Nineteenth Annual Ministerial Meetings of the Group of 77, held in New York respectively in September 1994 and September 1995, the Ninth Meeting of the Intergovernmental Followup and Coordination Committee on ECDC (IFCC-IX), held in Manila on 9-12 February 1996, and the Twentieth, Twenty-first, Twenty-second, Twenty-third, Twenty-fourth, Twenty-fifth and Twenty-sixth Annual Ministerial Meetings of the Group of 77 held in New York respectively in September 1996. September 1997, September 1998, September 1999, September 2000, November 2001 and September 2002 the Committee of Experts of the Perez-Guerrero Trust Fund (PGTF) for ECDC/TCDC held its eighteenth meeting in New York from 29 July 2003 to 1 August 2003.
- 2. The meeting was attended by five of the six members of the Committee, representing the three regions of the Group of 77. Dr. Eduardo Praselj, chairman of the Committee for the biennium 2002-2003, chaired the meeting. The list of participants appears as annex I.
- 3. The Deputy Director and other officers of the Special Unit for South-South Cooperation of UNDP were invited to provide information on matters related to the PGTF. A representative of the Treasury Division of UNDP was also invited by the Committee to provide information on matters related to the yield of PGTF resources and the structure of the PGTF portfolio.
- 4. The Committee adopted the following substantive agenda:
 - 1. Review to the operations of the PGTF;
 - 2. Consideration of new project proposals;
 - 3. Assessment of the implementation of approved projects;
 - 4. Other matters.
- 5. The Committee had before it the following documents:
 - 1. Eighteen (18) project proposals;
 - 2. Seventeen (17) progress, terminal and financial reports;
 - 3. The report of the First Special Meeting of the Committee of Experts;
 - 4. Note by the Office of the Chairman on the status of approved projects;
 - 5. Note by UNDP on the composition and yield of the PGTF portfolio;
 - 6. Note by UNDP on the financial status of PGTF and the status of implementation of approved projects;
 - 7. Report by UNDP on an operating review of PGTF.
- 6. According to the information submitted by UNDP on the financial status of PGTF, total available funds for supporting project proposals in 2003 are approximately US\$246,000, including projected interest earnings until 31 December 2003. Therefore, in line with guideline A(p) for utilization of PGTF, the maximum support that could be given to any individual project would be US\$49,200.

II. REVIEW OF THE OPERATIONS OF PGTF

7. The Committee examined a number of operational issues regarding the performance of the PGTF, namely highlights of its operations, yield and expansion of its resources, associated costs and operational arrangements, and survey on the impact of PGTF.

Highlights of sixteen years of operation of PGTF (1986-2002)

- 8. In 1986, a high level Meeting on ECDC held at Cairo defined the main features for launching operations of the PGTF, including definition of the objectives of the Fund and criteria for project eligibility, as well as operational arrangements for the submission, appraisal and approval of project proposals.
- 9. The trust fund was established with a core capital of US\$5 million. According to the guidelines for its utilization, only the interest accruing on the Fund could be used fro project support so as to preserve intact the initial US\$5 million. The core capital plus unexpended resources in any given year constitute the interest bearing resources (i.e. between US\$6.2 and 7.2 million from 1987 to 2002).
- 10. From 1986 to 2002, 488 projects proposals were submitted to the PGTF and, according to the guidelines for its utilization, the Fund has provided support to 128 projects with a total allocation of US\$8.3 million, i.e. a yearly average of 8 projects and US\$518,000 respectively.
- 11. In order to increase the multiplier effect of PGTF resources, the guidelines for utilization of PGTF require that project sponsors secure contributions from other sources of an amount at least equal to the contribution requested from PGTF. Contributions from other sources for the 1986-2002 period amount to US\$16.6 million, i.e. US\$2 for each US\$ of PGTF resources.
- 12. A breakdown of the areas that have received support from PGTF is as follows:

Yield of PGTF resources

- 15. Following the recommendations contained in paras. 20-23 of the report of the Committee at its ninth meeting in 1994, the Committee at its eighteenth meeting examined the situation of the interest rates and yield of PGTF resources.
- 16. Total PGTF resources are constituted by the core capital (US\$ 5 million) and unexpended resources. According to guideline F(g) for utilization of PGTF, the core capital should be preserved intact and only interest accrued and other earnings (i.e. additional contributions, reversion of allocated resources) could be used to support projects. Between 1987 and 2002, total resources have been in the range of US\$ 6.2 to 7.2 million.
- 17. PGTF resources are invested by the UNDP in accordance with its financial rules and regulations, and the investment policy is discussed and agreed upon with the PGTF Committee of Experts. In the current very low interest level environment, the core capital resources have been invested in five one million US\$ instruments in a structure with staggered maturities from one to five years. Every year, one of these instruments will mature, thereby enabling PGTF to take advantage of the best market conditions prevailing at that moment.
- 18. The PGTF portfolio by mid-July 2003 was constituted by the following resources:

- 19. In the next twelve months two bonds will mature with US\$ 500,000 in December 2003 and US\$ 1 million in June 2004. The proceeds would be reinvested so as to maintain the staggered maturity structure and the coupon payments would be kept in the money market fund for liquidity purposes.
- 20. The Committee discussed with the representative of the UNDP Treasury Division options for maximizing returns through investment in high-quality securities with longer maturities as part of the investment portfolio. In particular, the Committee suggested that since the core capital could not be utilized for supporting projects, some 20 percent of the portfolio be invested in securities with up to 10-year maturities. The Treasury Division would seek approval of the UNDP Investment Committee, since its investment guidelines limit the maxim maturities to 5 years.
- 21. The Committee noted with concern that because of the current annual inter-fund settlement, interest was charged for the funds disbursed by UNDP on behalf of PGTF, while a significant amount of funds was kept in liquid low-interest money market accounts for the same purpose. As an immediate remedy to this situation, it was agreed to reduce PGTF money market funds balance to a minimum and as soon as the UNDP is ready to do so to settle inter-fund balances on a monthly rather than annual basis.
- 22. Even though this investment strategy represents the best option under the circumstances, effective earnings for 2003 would be only US\$246,000 (including interest earnings, funds reverted to PGTF from two approved projects that were not implemented within the established deadlines and contributions from member countries). This amount is significantly lower than the regular level that prevailed over the years, i.e. US\$ 400,000 to 500,000 per annum and calls for a significant effort to expand the resources of PGTF if the Fund is to remain responsive to support the growing needs of South-South cooperation. A breakdown of the availability of funds in the last five years is as follows:

Expansion of PGTF resources

23. The Committee examined again practical ways of implementing its recommendations regarding the expansion of the PGTF resources as approved by the Twentieth Annual Ministerial Meeting of the Group of 77 in 1996. As identified in 1996, options available for expanding PGTF resources fall within one of the following three categories: (a) increase of the core capital; (b) increase of the yield of the PGTF portfolio; and (c) increase of the multiplier effect of PGTF resources.

(a) Increase of the core capital

- 24. This option implies the enlisting of contributions from potential donors, which may include interested developed and developing countries as well as intergovernmental and non-governmental institutions and organizations.
- 25. On the basis of the experience gained from 1996 to 2002 and taking into account the recommendations contained in the Havana Programme of Action adopted by the South Summit, the Committee reiterated its recommendation to focus on the following actions, to be carried out by the Chairman of the Group of 77 in New York, with the support of the Chairman of the Committee of Experts of PGTF and in close coordination with the Chairmen/Coordinators of the other Chapters of the Group of 77.
- The Committee welcomed the twenty-six contributions already made by eighteen developing countries, namely Mauritius (US\$500) in 1997; Pakistan (US\$1,000), and Singapore (US\$2,000) in 1998; the Islamic Republic of Iran (US\$3,000), the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (US\$2,000), Cyprus (US\$2,000), Thailand (US\$2,000), Malaysia (US\$2,000), Algeria (US\$2,000), India (US\$2,000), and the Philippines (US\$1,500) in 1999; China (US\$2,000), the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (a second contribution of US\$2,000) in 2000; Egypt (US\$2,000), the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (a third contribution of US\$2,000) in 2001; the United Republic of Tanzania (US\$5,000), Cyprus (a second contribution of US\$3,000), the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (a fourth contribution of US\$2,000), Thailand (a second contribution of US\$2,290), and Egypt (a second contribution of US\$2,000) in 2002; and Indonesia (US\$2,000), Kuwait (US\$3,000) and Cyprus (a third contribution of US\$2,775) up to 28 July 2003. Total contributions from these countries amount to US\$57,000.
- 27. The Committee noted with satisfaction that five developing countries, namely the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (four contributions), Cyprus (three contributions), Singapore (two contributions), Thailand (two contributions) and Egypt (two contributions), have made multiple contributions to PGTF and invited other countries to follow this encouraging initiative.
- 28. As indicated in paragraphs 15-20 of the report of the special meeting, the Committee recommended two mutually supportive approaches to enlist contributions from member countries of the Group of 77, namely (i) to continue requesting small contributions (i.e., a notional amount of US\$2,000) from all member countries as a sign of the commitment of the largest possible number; and (ii) to request larger contributions from member countries in a position to contribute more. While the former represents a continuation of ongoing efforts, the latter represents a new modality regarding mobilization of resources for PGTF.
- 29. In order to be effective, the effort for enlisting larger contribution would require a structured preparatory process involving, inter alia, advance notification to the member countries, timely preparation of the relevant documents and convening of gatherings at an appropriate high level. To this end and in consultation with the Chairman of the Group of 77, the upcoming United Nations Pledging Conference

for Development Activities to be held in New York in November 2003 would be an appropriate venue for this fund-raising effort so that member countries of the Group of 77 could announce their contribution on this occasion. In this context, the Committee appealed to the member countries of the Group to consider making contributions to the PGTF resources, in particular in the light of the benefits received by the vast majority of the member countries as a result of implementation of PGTF funded projects.

- 30. Information on the progress of the preparations of the fund-raising process would be provided to member countries on the occasion of the Annual Ministerial Meeting of the Group of 77.
- (b) <u>Increase of the yield of the PGTF portfolio</u>
- 31. As indicated in paragraph 20 of this report, efforts are underway to include securities issued by supranational and government agencies with longer-term maturities in the PGTF portfolio so as to increase returns and hence the availability of resources for supporting projects. These efforts should be seen in the context that preservation of the PGTF core resources should be the paramount consideration when exploring investment options.
- (c) <u>Increase of the multiplier effect of PGTF resources through co-financing with other institutions</u>
- 32. The Committee recommended that consultations and discussions currently underway with institutions interested in co-financing projects with the PGTF be continued. In particular, pilot projects jointly supported by UNIDO and PGTF, and by the Postal Union of the Americas, Spain and Portugal (UPAEP) and PGTF were prepared and submitted for consideration by the Committee of Experts, within the framework of cooperative agreements with these institutions. In addition, a number of proposals submitted to the PGTF this year have been presented to the OPEC Fund for International Development which has indicated that these proposals would be included in their pipeline of requests for support and examined in a timely fashion.

Costs associated to PGTF activities and revised operating arrangements

- 33. The Committee held a special meeting to review the operations of PGTF from 11 to 13 June 2003. In this meeting, the Deputy Director of the Special Unit for South-South Cooperation of the UNDP presented the draft terms of reference for an operating review of the PGTF to evaluate and recommend management options. The Committee considered on that occasion that the review should focus on the following three issues, namely (i) identification of opportunities for streamlining the whole process of providing support to PGTF by the UNDP; (ii) identification of alternative modalities for carrying out this process; and (iii) assessment of the costs incurred in the streamlined process.
- 34. During the Eighteenth Meeting of the Committee, the Deputy Director presented the above-mentioned report. The main findings of this report are an assessment of the costs incurred by the UNDP in providing support to PGTF, calculated using different methodologies, and recommendations for simplifying and streamlining the related processes. A conclusion of the report is that regardless of the method of calculation, there would be a cost associated to the UNDP support and that the only way to reduce or eliminate the UNDP costs would be to streamline processes or eliminate unnecessary procedures.
- 35. As a result of the exchange of views between the members of the Committee and the Deputy Director and other UNDP officers, there was agreement on actions aimed at simplifying and streamlining the process. These actions are as follows:

- a. The current model format for submitting proposals will be revised and simplified so as to be appropriate for immediate signature as the PGTF project document without further amendments or rework by the submitting entities or the UNDP. This would eliminate a significant amount of processing time and cost and will enable the UNDP to authorize disbursements shortly after approval of the project by the Annual Ministerial Meeting. The revised model format appears as Annex IV.
- b. This arrangement would only be feasible and practical if submitting entities strictly adhere to the revised model format for project proposals. Therefore, the Committee would not consider proposals that are not submitted fully in compliance with the requirement of the model format. Prospective submitting entities would be informed of this requirement in the invitations for submitting proposals issued at the beginning of each project cycle by the Chairman of the Group of 77. This requirement would also be clearly stated in the webpage of the Group of 77.
- c. In the event that the allocation of PGTF resources to eligible projects differs from the amounts requested and adjustments are required in the project activities and/or budget, the Office of the Chairman will notify the submitting entities immediately after the regular meeting of the Committee of Experts and request them to make the necessary adjustments prior to submission and approval by the Annual Ministerial Meeting of the recommended projects.
- d. The requisite of preparing subcontracts or memoranda of understanding between the implementing and executing agencies would be eliminated by including in the cover page of the revised project document provision for signature of the representatives of both the implementing and executing agencies, as well as the UNDP. This will significantly reduce the workload of the UNDP country offices.
- 36. While the streamlining resulting from the implementation of the above-mentioned actions would lead by itself to a significant reduction in support costs, the Committee considered that this issue should be approached within the overall guidance provided by the Administrator of the UNDP in his letter of June 2003 to the Chairman of the Group of 77. In his letter, the Administrator indicated his willingness to support the PGTF activities by requesting the Special Unit to work closely with the Group of 77 in order to keep the costs associated with the handling of PGTF activities at a bare minimum, without compromising the quality and effectiveness of service to PGTF projects.

Survey of the impact of PGTF

37. On the basis of the recommendation of the Committee at its twelfth meeting in 1997, a survey on the impact and benefits of the projects funded by PGTF was initiated in 1998, with a view to supporting the promotion of the Fund. To date the Office of the Chairman has received information on 38 of the 62 PGTF-supported projects that have been completed. A summary of the results of the survey is presented in Section V of this report (cf. paras. 266 to 299).

III. CONSIDERATION OF NEW PROJECT PROPOSALS

- 38. The Committee had before it eighteen (18) project proposals submitted to avail of the financing of PGTF. The list of these proposals is as follows:
 - (1) Sodium sulfate purification project

- 39. The following eight (8) proposals were received after the established deadline of 30 April 2003 and therefore were not considered by the Committee at this session. They will be taken up at the next meeting of the Committee.
 - (1) Study for the liberalization of the agricultural inputs supply and distribution chain in Togo
 - (2) Support to the preparation of legislation on cooperatives in Togo
 - (3) Strengthening of the veterinarian private sector in Togo
 - (4) Preparation of a rural land plan in Togo
 - (5) Survey for and establishment of technical and professional centers in lower towns in Togo
 - (6) Transformation of the Togo national center for professional improvement into a national institute for training and professional improvement

Project proposal No. 1 - Sodium sulfate purification project

- 40. The proposal was submitted by the Myanmar Paper & Chemical Industries, and endorsed by the Ministry of Industry of Myanmar. No other developing countries are involved in the project.
- 41. According to the text of the proposal, the overall objective of the project is to substitute imports and save foreign currency by developing high-quality raw materials. Specific objectives are: (a) to solve problems related to the purification process of sodium sulfate from natural sand soap; and (b) to reduce transportation costs by producing sodium sulfate crystals.
- 42. Total cost of the project, to be carried out in one to two months, is estimated at US\$100,000. The contribution requested from PGTF amounts to US\$80,000 and there is an-kind contribution of US\$3,000 by the host country. There is no indication of the origin of the remaining inputs. A breakdown of the total cost is as follows:

- 43. In the light of the information provided, the Committee considered that this proposal corresponded to a national project that is not eligible for funding from PGTF. The Committee therefore recommended that this proposal should <u>not</u> avail from the financing of PGTF.

Project proposal No.2 - Cotton development project

- 44. The proposal was submitted by the Myanmar Cotton and Sericulture Enterprise, and endorsed by the Ministry of Agriculture and Irrigation of Myanmar. No other developing countries are involved in the project.
- 45. According to the text of the proposal, the objectives of the project are: (a) to develop tailor-made cotton varieties to fit into different ecological niches specific for pre-monsoon, monsoon and late-monsoon cotton growing seasons in Myanmar; (b) to combine seasonal and regional adaptability of these varieties with high-yield capacity, superior lint quality and maximum degree of resistance to pests and diseases; (c) to initiate a commercial hybrid cotton production system; (d) to develop resistance management strategies for combating major pests; and (e) to establish sound technical recommendations for the use of insecticides, in particular of synthetic pyrethroids.
- 46. Total cost of the project, to be carried out over a two-year period, is estimated at US\$126,200. The contribution sought from PGTF amounts to US\$104,000 and the host country contribution amounts to 15 million kyats (US\$22,200). A breakdown of the total cost is as follows:

<u>Project proposal No.3 - Cooperation for floriculture and vegetable growing technology among developing countries</u>

- 48. The proposal was submitted by the Government of the Democratic People's Republic of Korea, the executing agency being the Pyongyang Horticulture Group. Other participating are Ethiopia, Mali, Sudan, Tanzania and Uganda.
- 49. According to the text of proposal, the objectives of the project are: (a) to establish breeding and culture methods of flowers and industrialization system in beneficiary countries, and (b) to solve problems arising in the culture of vegetable and make a forest resources and ecological management suitable for each beneficiary country situation on the basis of collective self-reliance.
- 50. Total cost of the project to be carried out in twelve months is estimated at US\$271,000. The contribution sought from PGTF amounted to US\$91,100. A breakdown of the total cost is as follows:

<u>Project proposal No. 4 - Development of new technologies and products for the whole utilization of marginal and primary yeast as sources of food (YAF)</u>

- 52. The proposal was submitted by the Cuban Institute for Research on Sugar Cane By-products (ICIDCA), headquartered in Havana, Cuba, endorsed by the Ministry of Foreign Investment and Economic Collaboration of Cuba. Other participating countries are Argentina and Mexico.
- 53. According to the text of the proposal, the objective of the project is to carry out experimental trials in alcohol-yeast complexes, fodder yeast factories and breweries that will permit: (i) yeast biomass and fermentation broth characterization aimed at designing the optimal use in each condition; (ii) identification of critical process steps affecting the quality of by-produced yeast; (iii) optimization of the main production of highest yeast quality, making a deep insight of those stages; (iv) increase of plant profitability and minimize associated costs by the development and validation of improved industrial operating conditions; and (v) provision to the industry of skilled technical advise on technologies and products.
- Total cost of the project, to be carried out over a two (2) year period, is estimated at US\$245,000. The contribution sought from PGTF amounts to US\$102,160. A breakdown of the total cost is as follows:

- 56. The proposal was submitted by Sahel Defis Burkina, a non-governmental organization, with offices in Ouagadougou, Burkina Faso.

According to the text of the proposal, the objectives of the project are: (a) installation of the centralized sites for information, training and environmental education; (b) effective organization of seminars, reception and lodging of interns; (c) holding of cultural events, promotion of Sahelian artists; and (d) implementation of agricultural, livestock and handicraft activities.
- 58. Total cost of the project to be carried out over a two-year period is estimated at US\$ 191,620. The contribution requested from PGTF amounts to US\$ 94,663. A breakdown of the total cost is a follows:

In the light of the information provided, the Committee considered that it was not possible to ascertain the cooperative element of the project, since there is no written evidence of endorsement of or declared interest in this proposal by other countries as potential beneficiaries, as required by guideline A(f) for utilization of PGTF. The Committee therefore recommended that this proposal should <u>not</u> avail from the financing of PGTF.

<u>Project proposal No. 6</u> - Regional Integrated Virtual Learning Environment for the Developing Countries

- 60. The proposal was submitted by the Arab Open University, Jordan, endorsed by the Ministry of Planning of Jordan. Other participating countries are Bahrain, Egypt, Kuwait, Lebanon and Saudi Arabia.
- 61. According to the text of the proposal, the objective of the project is to help reducing the costs associated with higher education in the developing countries, while maintaining the quality of the educational output and at the same time increasing the capacity of the educational system in terms of annual intake.
- 62. Total cost of the project, to be carried out over a two (2) year period, is estimated at US\$305,286. The contribution requested from PGTF amounts to US\$93,750. A breakdown of the total cost is as follows:

In the light of the information provided, the Committee considered that it was not possible to ascertain the cooperative element of the project, since there is no written evidence of endorsement of or declared interest in this proposal by other countries as potential beneficiaries, as required by guideline A(f) for utilization of PGTF. The Committee therefore recommended that this proposal should <u>not</u> avail from the financing of PGTF.

Project proposal No. 7 - Technology Transfer: assessing needs-promoting action

- 64. The proposal was submitted by the United Nations Industrial Development Organization (UNIDO), the executing agency being the African Regional Center for Technology (ARCT), headquartered in Dakar, Senegal. Participating countries are 13 countries from Africa (Cote d'Ivoire, Kenya, Nigeria, South Africa, Tanzania and Zimbabwe) and Asia (Indonesia, Jordan, Mongolia, Philippines, Pacific Islands Group, Thailand and Viet Nam).
- 65. According to the text of the proposal, the objectives of the project are: (a) to strengthen institutional capacity in assessing technological capabilities and needs at national, sectoral and enterprise levels through UNIDO methods, tools and interactive processes; and (b) to assist counterparts in developing capability-based technology upgrading programmes at national and sectoral levels and facilitate enterprise level technology needs matchmaking for techno-economic cooperation among participating developing countries.
- 66. Total cost of the project, to be carried out in one (1) year, is estimated at US\$110,000. Contribution sought from PGTF amounts to US\$45,000. A breakdown of the total cost is as follows:

67. This proposal represents a pilot project within a cooperative scheme evolved between UNIDO and the PGTF. In the light of the information provided, the Committee considered that this proposal complies with the guidelines for utilization of PGTF. The Committee recommended that this proposal avail from the financing of PGTF and that US\$ 45,000 be allocated to this end. This contribution should be disbursed in two tranches, disbursement of the second tranche being subject to the timely presentation of the relevant progress and financial reports.

Project proposal No. 8 - Regional integration of postal transportation in the Andean Community

- 68. The proposal was submitted by the Postal Union of the Americas, Spain and Portugal (UPAEP), headquartered in Montevideo, Uruguay, and endorsed by the postal administrations of the five participating Andean countries, namely Bolivia, Colombia, Ecuador, Peru and Venezuela. The executing agency will be a Colombian university.
- 69. According to the text of the proposal, the overall objective of the project is to improve the efficacy, quality, speed, reliability, and safety of the air, maritime and land transportation in the Andean region. In this context, specific objectives are: (i) to improve the synergic development of postal transportation; (ii) to integrate the regulatory aspects with the national institutions, using the existing infrastructure; (iii) to facilitate postal transportation in border areas; and (iv) to strengthen the operating systems of multimode transportation, especially those that use air transportation.
- 70. Total cost of the project, to be carried out in four (4) months, is estimated at US\$90,000. Contribution sought from PGTF amounts to US\$45,000. A breakdown of the total cost is as follows:

71. This proposal represents a pilot project within a cooperative scheme evolved between UPAEP and the PGTF. In the light of the information provided, the Committee considered that this proposal

complies with the guidelines for utilization of PGTF. The Committee recommended that this proposal avail from the financing of PGTF and that US\$ 25,000 be allocated to this end. This contribution should be disbursed in one single tranche.

Project proposal No. 9 - Establishment of a Raw Materials Information System for Africa (RMIS)

- 72. The proposal was submitted by the Raw Materials Research and Development Council, headquartered at Abuja, Nigeria, and endorsed by the Federal Ministry of Science and Technology and the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Nigeria. Other participating countries are Ghana, Liberia and Togo.
- 73. According to the text of the proposal, the objective of the project is to establish a raw materials information system for Africa. When established, the system would be able to generate and disseminate adequate information on raw materials to address basic sectoral problems arising from industries in the region; it would also strengthen the Action Committee on Raw Materials (ACRM) at gathering and disseminating data on raw materials in member countries of the Group of 77; and it is expected that the system would link with similar data banks in Latin America (Colombia) and Asia (India).
- 74. Total cost of the project, to be carried out over a three-year period, was not indicated in the proposal. However, the proposing institution would contribute US\$912,000 and expects to receive more inputs through donations from multilateral organizations. The contribution sought from PGTF amounts to US\$45,000. No breakdown of costs was provided in the proposal.
- 75. The Committee found that the proposal submitted for its consideration was incomplete. On the one hand, the proposal did not contain the required model format and only a summary description was submitted with no indication of the project activities, participation of other developing countries or detailed budget for the project. On the other hand, it was not possible to ascertain the cooperative element of the project as required by guideline A(f). Even though there is a list of potential beneficiary countries, there is no written indication of their endorsement of or declared interest in participating in the project.
- 76. The Committee recommended that this proposal should not avail from the financing of PGTF.

<u>Project proposal No. 10</u> - Development and strengthening of mechanisms for solving conflicts on shared natural resources in the Karamajong ecosystem in East Africa

- 77. The proposal was submitted by the UNCCD Secretariat on behalf of the governments of Kenya, Sudan and Uganda, as participating countries. The executing agency will be the African Union IBAR (Inter-African Bureau for Animal Resources), headquartered in Nairobi, Kenya.
- 78. According to the text of the proposal, the overall objective of the project is to assist and support the pastoral communities in achieving a sustainable utilization of shared natural resources without significant conflicts. In this context, specific objectives would be: (i) rationalization of rangelands use through positive change in land tenure and land use policy; (ii) intervention in conflict transformation and pastoral community peace-building; (iii) analysis of livestock and environment interactions; and (iv) promotion of the rational use of rangelands and pastoral livelihoods through the application of appropriate range management techniques.
- 79. This project is carried out within the framework of the Thematic Programme Network No. 3 "Rational Use of Rangelands and Promotion of Fodder Crops Development" in the context of the Regional Action Programme to Combat Desertification in Africa.

80. Total cost of the project, to be carried out in one (1) year, is estimated at US\$160,000. The contribution requested from PGTF amounts to US\$100,000. A breakdown of the total cost is as follows:

Project proposal No. 11 - A large-scale introduction to the African Market Garden in the Sahel

- 82. The proposal was submitted by the UNCCD Secretariat on behalf of the governments of Burkina Faso, Mali, Niger and Senegal, as participating countries. The executing agency will be the ICRISAT (International Crops Research Institute for the Semi-Arid Tropics) Sahelian Center in the four countries.
- 83. According to the text of the proposal, the overall objective of the project is to install in each of three Sahelian countries (Burkina Faso, Mali and Senegal) 900 AMG units within a two-year span (the AMG –African Market Garden is a new system of irrigated agriculture for the African smallholders, using a low pressure drip irrigation). Additional specific objectives are: (i) to train 100 technical personnel from government technical staff, NARS, NGOs and farmers organizations on the operations of the AMG; (ii) to train 30 local vegetable seed producers on the art of vegetable seeds multiplication and 30 nurserymen on production of quality fruit tree plants; and (iii) to supply to the above quality vegetable seeds and quality fruit tree varieties to be incorporated in the AMG.
- 84. Total cost of the project, to be carried out over a two (2) year period, is estimated at US\$ 253,500. The contribution sought from PGTF amounts to US\$103,500. A breakdown of the total cost is as follows:

<u>Project proposal No. 12 - Sustainable conservation of Miombo and Savannah woodlands in the SADC region (Malawi, Mozambique, Tanzania, Zambia and Zimbabwe)</u>

- 86. The proposal was submitted by the UNCCD Secretariat on behalf of the governments of Malawi, Mozambique, Tanzania, Zambia and Zimbabwe, as participating countries, and endorsed by the Southern African Development Community Environment and Land Management Sector Coordination Unit (SADC-ELMS), headquartered in Maseru, Lesotho.
- 87. According to the text of the proposal, the overall objective of the project is to implement coordinated transboundary projects to protect, conserve and rebuild the Miombo and Savannah woodland species in an integrated and programmatic manner. In particular, the project will aim at: (a) restoring degraded Miombo and Savannah ecosystems; (b) conserving and utilizing the Miombo and Savannah ecosystems for sustainable livelihood; (c) consolidating and implementing existing practices and initiatives arising from the existing and ongoing activities in the two ecosystems; (d) enhancing and strengthening sustainable income-generating activities for poverty eradication; and (e) promoting activities within the two ecosystems that enhance economic and social development.
- 88. The proposal does not indicate the total cost of the project, to be carried out in one (1) year. Contribution sought from PGTF amounts to US\$105,000. Even though the proposal indicates that the proposing institution would provide technical support and coordination, and that there would be contributions in kind from the affected communities, there is no quantification of these contributions. A partial breakdown of the project costs is as follows:

In addition, the contribution requested from PGTF significantly exceeds the ceiling for 2003.
- 90. The Committee therefore recommended that this proposal should <u>not</u> avail from the financing of PGTF

<u>Project proposal No. 13 - Training, technology transfer and involvement of women and youth in productive activities in highly vulnerable municipalities in Guatemala, El Salvador, Nicaragua and Honduras</u>

- 91. The proposal was submitted by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Guatemala, the executing agency being the Center for Training and Development of Appropriate Technologies and Ecotechnologies of the Nutrition Institute of Central America and Panama (INCAP), headquartered in San Juan Sacatepequez, Guatemala. Other participating countries are El Salvador, Nicaragua and Honduras.
- 92. According to the text of the proposal, the overall objective of the project is to contribute to the sustainable economic and social development of women and youth from different ethnic groups, in highly vulnerable municipalities affected by drought and other climate disasters in El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and Nicaragua, through implementation of agriculture and livestock productive projects and small rural agro industries. Specific objective are: (a) to train at the Center leading women, community promoters and youth from different ethnic groups, as disseminators of appropriate technologies and ecotechnologies at the community level; (b) to implement sustainable productive agriculture and livestock projects with participation of community leaders trained at the Center and involvement of organized groups from each participating municipality; (c) to implement eight (8) small profitable and incomegenerating rural agro industries with women and youth involvement; (d) to establish a revolving community fund aimed at providing financial support to agriculture and livestock productive initiatives and small rural agro industries; and (e) to implement a marketing and commercialization system for products from the abovementioned initiatives and agro industries.
- 93. Total cost of the project, to be carried out over a two-year period, is estimated at US\$399,200. Contribution requested from PGTF amounts to US\$187,600. A breakdown of the total cost is as follows:

- 95. The proposal was submitted by the Foundation "Banco de la Provincia de Buenos Aires", endorsed by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Argentina. Other participating countries are Chile and Uruguay.
- 96. According to the text of the proposal, the objectives of the project are: (a) identification of opportunities for designing policies that would encourage the settlement of youth in rural areas and small communities; and (b) identification of opportunities for designing a technical cooperation project for the settlement of youth in rural areas and small communities.
- 97. Total cost of the project, to be carried out in six (6) months, is estimated at US\$100,000. Contribution sought from PGTF amounts to US\$45,000. A breakdown of the total cost is as follows:

<u>Project proposal No. 15</u> - Analysis of housing technologies in vulnerable situation for Latin America and the Caribbean since 1980

- 99. The proposal was submitted by the Habitat School of the National University of Colombia, located in Medellin, Colombia, and endorsed by the Colombian Agency for International Cooperation. There is no evidence of the participation of other developing countries in the project.
- 100. According to the text of the proposal, the overall objective of the project is to develop a documental research that recognize the state of technology in highly-vulnerable housings in countries of Latin America and the Caribbean since 1980, taking into account regional conditions. Specific objectives are: (a) to develop a conceptual and methodological framework in order to investigate, in some selected countries to be studied, the relationship between the technology of vulnerable housings and the peculiar conditions of each habitat and inhabitant group, in the context of the region to which they belong; (b) to recognize the housing technologies found in the most vulnerable population sectors and to study the singular conditions of the regional context in its environmental, social, cultural and economic dimensions; (c) to prepare a set of guidelines to address the technology of vulnerable housing, aiming at quality and sustainability criteria, that would provide analytic elements useful to various public, private, community and academic institutions in their developmental activities; and (d) to disseminate the results of the project.
- 101. Total cost of the project, to be carried out in eight (8) months, is estimated at US\$59,337. Contribution sought from PGTF amounts to US\$45,000. A breakdown of the total cost is as follows:

- 102. The Committee found that it was not possible to ascertain the cooperative element of the project, as required by guideline A(f) for utilization of PGTF. There is no evidence of the participation of other developing countries in the project and, even though the project envisages to study a regional situation and disseminate its results, as stated in guideline A(h) dissemination of results to interested countries cannot by itself be considered as a rationale for the cooperative element and hence the eligibility of the project. Finally, inputs from other sources are significantly lower than the resources requested from PGTF, thereby not complying with guideline A(m), which requires that all proposals should include inputs from other sources of an amount at least equal to the resources requested from PGTF.
- 103. The Committee therefore recommended that this proposal should <u>not</u> avail from the financing of PGTF.

<u>Project proposal No. 16</u> - Information network to promote strategies of socio-economic development in South American Camelids of Andean Countries

- 104. The proposal was submitted by the Research Center of the Universidad Católica de Santa María (St. Mary's Catholic University), from Arequipa, Peru, and endorsed by the National Council on Science and Technology (CONCYTEC) of Peru. Other participating countries are Chile and Ecuador.
- 105. According to the text of the proposal, the overall objective of the project is to integrate with the institutions involved in the management of South American camelids (SACs) (llamas, alpacas and similar species), with a view to establishing combined socio-economic development strategies among Andean countries. Specific objectives are: (a) to identify institutions, enterprises and producer communities of SACs in Ecuador, Chile and Peru, and disseminate information among them; (b) to promote and organize workshops with the above; (c) to share and disseminate work and research experiences in production and commercialization, as well as problems faced by and the socio-economic situation of SACs breeders; and (d) to promote the institutionalization of the agents involved in the implementation of strategies of socio-economic development of SACs in the Andean countries.
- 106. Total cost of the project, to be carried out in sixteen (16) months, is estimated at US\$90,300. Contribution requested from PGTF amounts to US\$44,900. A breakdown of the total cost is as follows:

107. In the light of the information available, the Committee considered that that this proposal complies with the guidelines for utilization of PGTF. The Committee therefore recommended that this proposal avail from the financing of PGTF and that US\$ 25,000 be allocated to this end. This contribution should be disbursed in one single tranche.

Project proposal No.17 - Design of a system of management of used pesticide containers

- 108. The proposal was submitted by the National Agricultural Health Service (SENASA) from Peru. Other participating countries are Bolivia and Ecuador.
- 109. According to the text of the proposal, the objectives of the project are: (a) to reduce damage caused by inadequate disposal of pesticide containers; (b) to provide an alternative to incineration or dumping of empty pesticide containers; and (c) to conserve a non-renewable resource that can be recycled into many other useful products.
- 110. Total cost of the project, to be carried out in one (1) year, is estimated at US\$90,000. The contribution requested from PGTF amounts to US\$45,000. A breakdown of the total cost is as follows:

111. In the light of the information available, the Committee considered that this proposal complies with the guidelines for utilization of PGTF. The Committee therefore recommended that this proposal avail from the financing of PGTF and that US\$ 25,000 be allocated to this end. This contribution should be disbursed in one single tranche.

<u>Project proposal No. 18 - Technical studies for the improvement of the In-Guezam (Algeria)-Arlit (Niger) section of the trans-Saharan route</u>

- 112. The proposal was submitted by the Ministry of Public Works of Algeria. The executing agency would be the engineering company SAETI from Algeria. Other participating countries would be Nigeria and Niger.
- 113. According to the text of the proposal, the objective of the project is to carry out technical studies aimed at improving the road section In-Guezam (Algeria)-Arlit (Niger), with a view to (a) ensuring road connections Algiers-Lagos in all seasons; (b) developing trade flows between Algeria and Nigeria; and (c) improving circulation conditions for road users.
- 114. Total cost of the project, to be carried out in twelve (12) months, is estimated at US\$300,000, the totality of which is the contribution requested from PGTF. No breakdown of the total cost was provided in the proposal.
- 115. In the light of information available, the Committee considered that this proposal is incomplete, since only a summary was provided with no indication of project activities, participation of other

developing countries or detailed budget for the project. In addition, the Committee noted that there are no inputs from the sponsors and therefore the proposal does not comply with guideline A(m) for utilization of PGTF, which requires that all proposals should include inputs from other sources of an amount at least equal to the resources requested from PGTF. Finally, it was not possible to ascertain the cooperative element of the project, since even though the proposal indicates the potential participating countries, there is no written evidence of their declared interest of or explicit participation in the activities of the project, as required by guideline A(f).

116. The Committee therefore recommended that this proposal should <u>not</u> avail from the financing of PGTF.

SUMMARY OF PROJECT PROPOSALS RECOMMENDED FOR ADOPTION

117. In summary, the Committee recommended that the following eight (8) new project proposals avail from the financing of PGTF and resources allocated to this end amount to US\$ 235,000. A breakdown of this total is as follows:

- 118. According to the information provided by UNDP, total available resources for funding new project proposals in 2003 amount to approximately US\$246,000. This amount includes the projected interest earnings from 1 January to 31 December 2003. A detailed breakdown of the financial status of PGTF is provided in Annex III.
- 119. Co-financing of projects with other institutions would increase the support given to eligible projects. On the one hand, as part of co-financing agreements, the United Nations Industrial Development is providing US\$65,000 as its contribution to the pilot project entitled "Technology Transfer: assessing needs-promoting action" and the Postal Union of the Americas and Portugal (UPAEP), as part of a co-financing agreement with PGTF, is providing US\$45,000 as its contribution to a pilot project entitled "Regional integration of postal transportation in the Andean Community".
- 120. The eight (8) proposals recommended for approval by the Committee of Experts have also been submitted for support to the OPEC Fund for International Development, as part of a joint co-financing effort by both institutions. The OPEC Fund indicated that these proposals had been included in their pipeline of projects under consideration for grant assistance and that these proposals would be reviewed

in a timely fashion. In the event that a positive decision by the OPEC Fund be forthcoming before the Annual Ministerial Meeting of the Group of 77 in September 2003, the OPEC Fund contribution would be added to the PGTF allocation. For those projects where the combined amounts of both contributions exceed the sums requested by the submitting entities, the PGTF contribution will be adjusted accordingly. To this end, the Committee entrusted its Chairman with the task of introducing the foregoing adjustments to approved projects, as appropriate, and presenting them as an addendum of this report to the Annual Ministerial Meeting of the Group of 77.

IV. ASSESSMENT OF THE IMPLEMENTATION OF APPROVED PROJECTS

- 121. The Committee examined the status of implementation of the projects adopted by IFCC-VI held in Havana in September 1987, by the Twelfth Annual Meeting of the Ministers for Foreign Affairs of the Group of 77 held in New York in September 1988, by IFCC-VII held in Kuala Lumpur in July-August 1989, by the Thirteenth, Fourteenth, Fifteenth and Sixteenth Annual Meetings of Ministers for Foreign Affairs of the Group of 77 held respectively in New York in September 1989, October 1990, September 1991 and October 1992, by IFCC-VII held in Panama City in August-September 1993 and by the Eighteenth, Nineteenth, Twentieth, Twenty-First, Twenty-second, Twenty-third, Twenty-fourth, Twenty-fifth and Twenty-sixth Annual Meetings of Ministers for Foreign Affairs, held in New York respectively in September 1994, September 1995, September 1996, September 1997, September 1998, September 1999, September 2000, November 2001, and September 2002.

- 123. According to the status of their implementation, approved projects can be grouped into several categories:
 - (a) Projects completed;
 - (b) Projects under implementation;
 - (c) Projects under preparation still to be implemented;
 - (d) Projects not implemented and allocated funds reverted to PGTF;
 - (e) Projects under query
- 124. Completed and non-implemented projects could be considered as inactive and their main features are included as reference in Annex II.

A. **PROJECTS UNDER IMPLEMENTATION**

- 125. Forty-four (44) approved projects were being implemented as of the date of the Eighteenth Meeting of the Committee of Experts. This total is the result of thirty-seven (37) projects that were under implementation during the period between the seventeenth and the eighteenth meetings of the Committee, plus eleven (11) that started being implemented during this period, minus four (4) that were completed. - 127. Disbursement of US\$25,560 allocated for the first year of the project (1996) was requested from UNDP in September 1996 as follows: US\$20,760 to IPS and US\$4,800 to the Group of 77. The subcontractor and the Office of the Chairman of the Group of 77 submitted financial statements on project activities undertaken during 1996 on 25 June 1997 and 5 June 1998, respectively. The project provided for publication of 24 issues in a two-year period, starting in 1996. The actual schedule of issues published was: 9 in 1996, 5 in 1997, 5 in 1998, 3 in 1999, 2 in 2000 and 1 in 2001.
- 128. In mid-January 2001 the UNDP authorized disbursement of the second tranche of US\$25,560. This total includes US\$20,760 to IPS and \$4,800 to the Group of 77. The Office of the Chairman submitted a financial statement to UNDP on 28 December 2001.
- 129. The Twenty-fifth Annual Ministerial Meeting of the Group of 77 (New York, 15 November 2001) approved a budget increase of US\$24,000 to US\$75,120. On 6 March 2003 UNDP authorized disbursement of US\$19,500 to IPS for the publication of the Journal and US\$4,500 to the Group of 77 for its dissemination.

- 132. On 15 January 1998, the UNDP authorized disbursement of a second tranche of US\$40,500 (i.e., less the token 10% withholding) to the subcontractor in 1998. The Committee recommended at its fifteenth meeting that the Office of the Chairman request the sub-contractor to submit the outstanding final report and statement of expenditures for the project before 31 December 2000.

- 133. A reminder was sent on 10 May 2001 by email requesting the outstanding reports. A second reminder was sent through the UNDP country office in July 2002. The Committee recommended at its seventeenth meeting that a final notice be sent to NCPD requesting submission of the outstanding reports before 31 December 2002.
- 134. No reply has been received from the sub-contractor as of mid-July 2003. The Committee therefore requested UNDP to follow up on this matter with NCPD and the Government of Trinidad and Tobago.

- 138. Three reminders requesting submission of progress and financial reports were sent, the last on 18 May 2001. No replies have been received from the subcontractor. The Committee at its seventeenth meeting recommended that a final notice be sent to FIOCRUZ requesting submission of the outstanding reports before 31 December 2002.
- 139. No reply has been received from the sub-contractor as of mid-July 2003. The Committee therefore requested UNDP to follow up on this matter with FIOCRUZ and the Government of Brazil.
